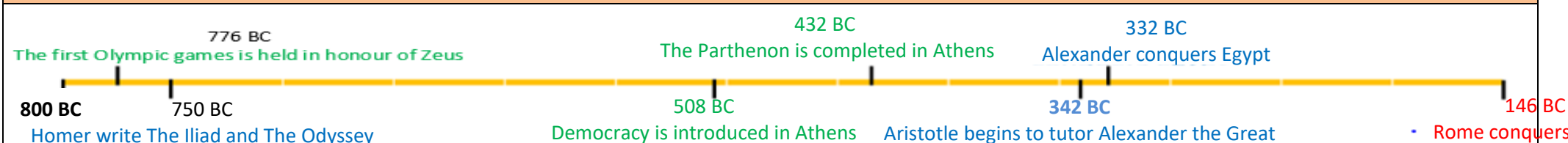

				Artemis	Moon Goddess
Polytheistic	Religious system where people believe in or worship more than one god	Plato	Philosopher and student of Socrates: best known for writing 'Republic'.	Hera	Queen of the Gods
Democracy	A system of government where eligible people elect representatives	Homer	Legendary author famous for writing the Iliad & Odyssey	Poseidon	God of the sea
Oligarchy	System of government where a small group of people control everything	Archimedes	Scientist & mathematician: famous for reportedly yelling 'Eureka!' after realizing the link between volume, density & displacement.	Hestia	Goddess of the hearth
Mount Olympus	The highest mountain in Greece and the mythological residence of the twelve Olympian Gods	Aristotle	His theory of biology was the first systematic observation and collection of data; categorizing living animals by carrying out dissections.	Aphrodite	Goddess of love
Parthenon	Temple dedicated to Athena located on the Acropolis	Pythagoras	Philosopher & mathematician most known for his rules of triangles	Ares	God of war
